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If you want a version where the user does not access the data via the Radicore interface, with its

XSL stylesheets and login screen, then you will have to create your own interface as discussed in Using Radicore components in a front-end website. This will allow you to generate whatever HTML/CSS/Javascript code you like, but still using Radicore's table classes for all database access and business rules.

Just to make it perfectly clear, there are NO examples of frontend web pages using Radicore simply because Radicore is for building back-office applications which are used by back-office staff. Web sites which can be accessed by casual visitors are a totally different kettle of fish.

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
