If I set permissions to 755 I get the message 'Cannot create directory ../ceae'

Also radicore is creating the app directories with the username 'nobody' and group 'nobody'.

I'm not an apache expert so I don't know if this is a Radicore issue or a hosting issue.

This is not a Radicore issue. It is a problem with the \*nix permissions system and the fact that when PHP is run as an Apache module it is given the user name of 'nobody' which somehow does not have sufficient permissions to create directories and/or files.

Unix/linux has the concept of users and groups in its permissions system, so if apache runs with the user id of 'nobody' what group does it belong to? Is it possible to make it the same group as the domain name so that you can reduce permissions to 775 instead of 777?
